DON BOSCO CANADA HELPS THE DON BOSCO INTERNS – NGANGI



More than 320 youth and children, Interns of the Don Bosco Youth Center of Ngangi of Goma, in the Democratic Republic of Congo, have benefited from the generosity of the Don Bosco Mission in Canada. The Salesian Mission of Canada, with big heart, has understood that the Don Bosco Salesian undertaking in Ngangi needs the support of numerous good wills on all fronts in order to perpetuate the Salesian charism. Because of its charitable act, God can accomplish wonders for the vulnerable youth who know no other world but that of the Don Bosco Ngangi Center. It is these young people from the BAKANJA, KIZITO, GAHINJA, MARGERITE house and the USHINDI orphanage which lodge babies who do not have the chance to enjoy the maternal warmth of their mothers.

The Don Bosco Mission has wished to make its presence felt in the purchase of food for these children who have received less in life but who have a right to a healthy diet like every other individual. Certainly it is no easy to feed them, but we must.

The daily intake of the young interns at Don Bosco Ngangi is approximately \$1,000 USD daily so that they may have acceptable meals for breakfast, lunch and supper.

The hardest to manage remains the USHINDI orphanage, Kizito and Gahinja house, for its multiple babies, children and young orphans, ex-soldier children and street children who need constant care. This entails a well-selected diet, a loving presence so as to maintain the healthy and psychological balance of these poor orphans.

The generous gesture of the Don Bosco Mission in Canada will remain etched in their memories for a long time. For all at Don Bosco Ngangi this gesture reveals the affection of benefactors towards them. They pray that God may, with His infinite blessings, shower all those benefactors so that on another fine day they think of them again.

YOUR DONATIONS HELP TURN A LIFE AROUND IN MOZAMBIQUE

Days ago, I received a letter from MIEL TAMARIS. She lives in MOZAMBIQUE (Africa) where I was fortunate to have worked for a while. This young lady humbly thanks our benefactors for the help she is receiving through our Missions Office of Montreal.

She has finished her third year in HOTEL and TOURISM Industry at the SUPERIOR INSITUTE "DON BOSCO" (Maputo city). Soon she will graduate and become active in the work market, with a qualified job and financial autonomy. She shares the following with us: "During any free time I take care of marginalized kids, youth and the elderly. The main problem I have is a lack of money for transportation to school. Even though I do my best for getting a good performance, my tiredness from my travel-walking distances diminishes my academic productivity."



I think that it useful describe briefly the life and story of this young lady. I intentionally do so because many times a benefactor can feel uncertain of the final

destination of funds donated. Rest assured that any donations submitted through our Missions Office will reach the right destination.

Miel Tamaris was 7 years old. Her father was widowed and had 6 more children at home. He sold her to a prostitution ring. Within this ring they prepared her for the market until she was 12. This girl, deprived from parental love and dignity, gave birth to a baby at the age of 14. She was repeatedly asked to have an abortion, but she refused and held on to her baby son. Trying to escape, she was repeatedly threatened with death. She began to participate at the little chapel "Beata Anuarite", that the Salesians have in an outskirt called "JARDIM". There, she met with Fr. Manuel Catonda, who suggested she attend the secondary school and invited her to apply to our Superior Institute "Don Bosco" and embark in studies for a career. Fr. Manuel asked me if I would be willing to help her. Our Canadian benefactors began to help her.

Miel says: "I had difficulties sharing with my colleagues, mainly because I feared being rejected: I overcame the struggle and focused on my training objectives despite it all. Perseverance made me stronger and I learnt to live together and accept our differences. It was through this training that I realized the true meaning of "Educate by teaching", and it was very surprising for me to know that I possess abilities in solving problems linked to educational and cognitive development of students. This was an invaluable experience! I thank everyone who has made this possible for me."

As I previously mentioned, MIEL is going to graduate very soon, this December 2016. She will then be able to face the life ahead of her, and raise her son. Most importantly, she now has dignity, worthiness and a happier future.

A TESTIMONY FROM CATERINA - MEXICO

I write to you with a great amount of joy from the Salesian community of Ciudad Juarez, Mexico. I have had the opportunity of animating many projects in the three oratories that we have and am now blessed with the role of youth minister and project coordinator. The most recent project that I am coordinating and animating is in the Juvenile Detention Center, known as CERSAI. Since February, I have been part of the development process of pastoral work and intervention with the 270 sentenced young people between the ages of 15-25 years old. With only 4 hours a week of Salesian presence with the youth, we try our best to bring joy through games and animation as well as our love of Christ and spirit of Don Bosco. My main role, other than coordinating this project from the outside, is to get to know and accompany the youth that are serving their time. As the animation team intervenes with games and sports, I spend most of my time individually getting to know the situations and hardships of the youth. The future goal of this project is to create halfway houses in one of our oratories and have the youth complete the last few

months of their sentence within our oratory, accompanied by Salesian community. "Honest citizens and Good Christians, " as Don Bosco would say. Although this is a maximum detention center and we can all imagine the kind of crimes these young people have committed, all I continue



to see are good young people who have not been cared for properly. In every single one of them, I have found good friends and the face of Jesus. I see the want to play, the need to be listened to, to be loved by someone and believed in. When I asked Juan, a 14 year old inmate, what he would want to tell the world if everyone would listen to what he had to say. He answered: "I would tell the world that I want to know more about this Don Bosco guy you talk so much about so that I can get other kids my age out of the drug life. I would show them that I'm not a bad kid even though I made big mistakes." Juan has at least 6 more years in CERSAI but says the first thing he wants to do when he is released is get to know the oratory. I share this testimony asking for one thing from anyone who is reading this.

I ask that you pray for every young person who is struggling with right and wrong, who is desperate, who is trying to find their purpose in this life. These precious young souls are our oratory boys that Don Bosco spent his life fighting for and believing in. I have seen hurt, pain, the struggle to want to continue and find freedom and the best way I can accompany the youth in Ciudad Juarez is by reaching out and asking for your prayers.

RISING FROM THE RUBBLES, BANGALORE



Vijaykumar, son of Baburao and Esther, is from a very poor family at Sunknal in Bidar, North Karnataka. Vijay's father was an agricultural daily wage earner. In order to supplement their income they used to have a buffalo or a cow. Baburao has a

large family with 5 girls and 2 boys. The girls were married at a young age. Weak in studies, Vijay was more interested in helping his father to graze the cows and buffalos. So at the age of 11 he chose to drop out of school. Don Bosco fathers while visiting his village met him and befriended him. He agreed to come along with them to Don Bosco Child Labour Centre. After completing the bridge course, Vijay was main streamed into 7th grade at Siddhartha Primary school, Bidar. He often picked up quarrels with whoever crossed his path. These fights landed Vijay in real trouble. He was barred from writing the 9th grade examination. The rector of Don Bosco once again came to his rescue pleading with the school authorities to give him one more chance and they agreed. After this Vijay was brought back to Don Bosco, Bidar, where he continued his studies. His teachers encouraged him and tried to bring the best out of him. A change came over Vijay at Don Bosco. He showed interest in performing dances and also began to teach other boys. He had a great sense of rhythm and would beautifully play Hallige, a type of drum. He emerged to be so responsible that our Director could entrust to Vijay the running of the center whenever the warden was absent. Though the studies were tough, he put in a lot of hard work. In the SSLC exams (final exams at school), he passed with 60% marks. Today, Vijay has a dream! He has already enrolled himself at Don Bosco ITI, for the Electricians course. His aim is to work and earn for his family and take care of his parents. Speaking of his transformation he says: "I was a rowdy and a stubborn boy till 9th grade. But I realized that I had to change in order to be someone of worth. The atmosphere at Don Bosco was encouraging and motivating which played a crucial role in my life.
